Illinois Surgical Technologist Laws and Regulations

Certification

The State of Illinois does not require surgical technologists to be certified in order to work in the state, but professional certification is strongly preferred and often required by the employers.

As stated on <u>https://www.nbstsa.org/</u> "...because certification is voluntary, the choice to become certified exhibits pride in the profession, the desire to be recognized for mastery of scientific principles, as well as an ongoing commitment to quality patient care. Certification is a means for upward mobility, a condition for employment, a route to higher pay, and a source of recognition nationwide. Approved candidates who take and pass the CST examination are authorized to use the initials CST as long as they maintain certification currency."

Registration

Effective December 31, 2013, the State of Illinois prohibits individuals from using the title "Registered Surgical Technologist" unless the individual is registered with the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation (IDFPR). An individual can only register if he or she is currently certified by the National Board of Surgical Technology and Surgical Assisting (NBSTSA) <u>or</u> has completed a military surgical technology program. Registration is only necessary for individuals who want to use the "Registered Surgical Technologist" title.

- Effective November 27, 2018, in order for a Surgical Technologist (ST) to renew his/her registration (*Registered Surgical Technologist (RST*)) with the Illinois Department of Financial &



Professional Regulation (IDFPR), the ST must show proof that his/her certification is current (up to date).

<u>License</u>

The State of Illinois does not require surgical technologists to have a license in order to work in the state

Indiana Surgical Technologist Laws and Regulations

Certification

Effective July 1, 2009, the State of Indiana prohibits individuals from using the title "certified surgical technologist" or using the initials "CST" <u>unless</u> the individual has and maintains the Certified Surgical Technologist (CST) credential from the National Board of Surgical Technology and Surgical Assisting (NBSTSA); <u>or</u> has completed a military surgical technology program, in order to practice in the state.

- Vein Harvesting: CSTs <u>cannot harvest veins in Indiana</u> <u>unless</u> the CST also has and maintains the Certified Surgical First Assistant (CSFA) credential from the NBSTSA.
- Grandfather Exception:
 - The grandfather exception is <u>not</u> to be applied to individuals hired <u>after</u> the effective date of this law.
 - If a surgical technologist is grandfathered under this law, that does <u>not</u> mean they have been given an automatic certification.
 - Healthcare facilities may still require certification as a condition of employment for its surgical technology staff - even if the employee was grandfathered.

License/Registration

The State of Indiana does not require surgical technologists either to have a license or to register with the state in order to work in the state.

Wisconsin Surgical Technologist Laws and Regulations

Currently, this state does not have any laws or regulations that require surgical technologists to be licensed, certified, or registered in order to work in the state. However, individual healthcare facilities may require surgical technologists to be certified as a condition of employment. Please contact the facility for more information on its hiring requirements.
